Book Summary

Hebrews - Jesus is Better

Hebrews. A book of the Bible that has intrigued, confused, challenged and blessed people for many hundreds of years. Who was it written by? Who is this mysterious Melchizedek? Last term, it was CY's chance to tackle this challenging and exciting book and see what nuggets of gold God had in store for us. We finished the first 10 and a half chapters, with the remainder to be completed in Term 3 - where we will look at what practical difference all this theology should make to our lives). What we have discovered and learnt so far has been no less than amazing!



KEY VERSE: "Now faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see." - Hebrews 11:1

Hebrews is a book of mystery. Scholars are not sure who exactly wrote it, and to whom exactly it was written to. The typical greeting at the start of the letter is not there, and stylistically it is not written quite like the typical letter. However, much can be

gathered from the content of the writing to determine who it was written for. From the main arguments in the text, presumably it was written to Hebrew Christians, and hence the name "Hebrews".

Much attention is given to details of the Old Testament and the old covenant. From the priesthood, to sacrifices, and the tabernacle, this book requires us to know a fair bit of how the old covenant worked. The underlying theme of the book is an exhortation to persevere in the faith. It's clear from the content that the recipients of the text were tempted to return to the old covenant way of things. The purpose the author has in mind for this text is to remind these Hebrew Christians that Jesus is so much better than the old covenant, the sacrificial system and the old priesthood. Jesus is far superior than all of these in every way. Thus, if you want a real reason to run the Christian race - set your eyes upon Jesus.

Book Summary (cont'd)

Hebrews - Jesus is Better

The first three studies saw us look at the man Jesus, is also God's son. What does it mean for Christ to be God's son? What does it mean that Jesus is a man? Being God's son sets Jesus apart from all humanity, as well as the angels. And therefore, the message that Christ brings us - the gospel, is not to be ignored. Jesus being a man also means he is able to relate to us as humans and fulfill the role God had given to humanity at creation. For these reasons, the gospel of Christ is way better than the old covenant, which in some ancient Hebrew tradition, was believed to have been given by the angels.

The next four studies saw us look at Jesus in comparison with the old high priest, the old priesthood, the old covenant, and the old sacrifices. No prizes here for guessing that Jesus is superior to all of these! Christ has been appointed by God as a high priest, even though he was not of the tribe of Levi. In fact, his priesthood is on a totally different level. Jesus is a priest in the order of Melchizedek - an eternal priesthood. Thus, being of this different priesthood, the new and better



covenant that was promised in Jeremiah 31 is established through the better and once for all sacrifice of Christ himself, at the true and heavenly tabernacle in the presence of God almighty. Jesus being human is able to relate to us in our trials and sufferings, yet being perfect is able to intercede on our behalf before God. The gospel of Christ far surpasses and trumps the old covenant. Despite the fact that we're not Hebrew Christians who are tempted to return to the old covenant, there are certain temptations in life which tempt

away from Christ and the sacrifice of himself that he made for us.

Hebrews reminds us that Christ's sacrifice is perfect, sufficient and once for all, able to take away our sin and cleanse our consciences from all guilt. We have no need to rely on our own sacrifices of good works in order to please God - for Christ has achieved our righteousness through his blood, and always lives to intercede for us before God. Praise and glory to Jesus, our perfect high priest.

Where will your choices take you? Spin the wheel of fate and take a drive along the twisting roads that families have enjoyed for more than 40 years in The Game of Life for 2 to 6 players! You made it through high school, so now what's next? Go to college or start a career - it's your choice. Think the family life is for you? Take that path and see how many kids you'll have! Will you venture down the risky road where fortunes can be won... and lost? Do good deeds as you go through the game to earn Life Tiles and more money so you can retire in style...

And when you've earned your board game retirement, shake yourself off, hop in the car, fill up your tank, and take a trip to a place called Reality, where life is not a game.

Last term, CY held an evangelistic night, where CYers could invite their friends - Christian and not-yet - to be confronted with the good news of Jesus Christ and what his coming to earth means for every person on the planet who finds themselves in this game, called Life. Of course, the seriousness of the gospel message was offset with the “Game of Life” competition, or the pre-show entertainment. All the while, the inside of the school hall where CY meets was having its bland interiors prettified and made infinitely more atmospheric and appealing with a stack of cushions and beanbags, fairy lights, chairs and tables, mood lighting and a rug which was well worth the pain of relocating from my house. In short, the school hall looked less like a school hall, and more like a lounge designed by a 4th year interior and spatial design student (it wasn't, though).



Enter CYers. Cue feelings of wonderment and awe.

Following the Game of Life competition, was the formal part of the evening. We sang a song titled Man of Sorrows, which recounts the story of Christ's crucifixion and resurrection and the implications this has for us. We then split into small groups for discussion questions.

Questions included some such as:

- What is your dream job?
- What legacy would you like to leave behind?
- What are the things in life that really matter to you?
- What do you think of the idea that what matters in life is loving God and loving others?

What ensued was a moment where the CYers and their leaders thought seriously about the purpose of their lives on this earth, and challenged the notion that life ends when you die. The different segments of the night eventually led to a talk from Al Lum Mow on Luke 9:21-27, where Jesus predicts his death, and states that "whoever wants to save their life will lose it", but also promises that "whoever loses their life for [him] will save it". Al reminded us that, like with video games, the secret to winning at life is to have lots of lives. But the reality of the fallen world is that we only have one life,

and because of this, the only winner at life is death. Morbid.

But as we know, God has intervened in human history, and consequently we're faced with the reality of a historical, and undeniably real Jesus, who, metaphorically, punched #YOLO (You Only Live Once) in the face when he rose from the dead. Our speaker, Al, challenged us to think about the fact that we only have ONE life to live. When we die, our career, our legacy (assuming we leave one) and the things that matter most to us disappear in the light of eternity - so what can we possibly do in this life that is worthwhile?

To finish off the night, we sang, as both a song and a prayer, Garage Hymnal's "Take My Life". The words of the chorus are:

*Take my hands and let them move
at the impulse of Thy love;
Take my feet and let them be
swift and beautiful for thee;
Take my love, my Lord I pour,
at Thy feet its treasure store;
Take myself and I will be
ever, only, all for Thee,
ever, only, all for Thee.*

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Event Spotlight #2 (BGR) Christian Mingle: God's Plan for Relationships

What did this mysterious acronym have to do with the youth at CY this past term? Sometimes we take it for granted what this term stands for and the many potential meanings it implies. Simply put, BGR is just a quick way of saying Boy-Girl Relationships and inevitably induce excessive fear in Juniors, and heart-throbbing excitement in Seniors.

CY's BGR night - *Christian Mingle: God's Plan for Relationships* was held at the end of Term 2 and was a night of exploring and understanding God's plan for

relationships and the biblical truths and principles that His word points us towards.

The night was structured in two halves, very similar to our normal CY Friday nights. The first half of the night was arranged in a way that provoked our thoughts and questions about how we as humans relate to each, regardless of gender, and ultimately how our awesome God interpersonally relates between the three persons of the Trinity and with us, as weak sinful humans. The second half of the night was given to workshops (*Not Dating Not Interested, Single and Waiting: What to Look for in a Guy or Girl?* and *How to Not Lose Your Identity While Dating*), run by our very own leaders. Here the CYers could choose a workshop that interested them, or felt would speak to them, depending on their own attitudes and experiences.

Christian Mingle: God's Plan for Relationships

The first half of the night was filled with worship, skits, role-playing games, prayer, offertory, and a talk given by our very own Josh Lum Mow. Like all good BGR nights, the skits not only demonstrated the Oscar-worthy acting performances and dramaturgical skills of the CY leaders, but offered a window into our very own desires, thoughts, feelings and perceptions about what we sinfully expect in relationships and in what we deem to be the best for us. Returning for a third or fourth time (it's actually too difficult to keep track), Beth Tang returned as The Creepy Girl. The following snippet is a little taste of what you could have expected to experience on the night:

Creepy girl: Tall and athletic - like -, Skin as smooth as the moon walk, eyes that say - 'I want you'. I'm really really excited.

Ultimately, the skit asked us to re-assess and question the futility of the secular value of believing in "The One" – that boy or girl who we long for and expect to be our soul mate and BFF. These ideas formed part of the second workshop *Single and Waiting*. The role-playing game can be summed up in several words: CYers, CY leaders, whipped cream, bread, make-up, earthquake, mess, LOLing and embarrassment. Sometimes relationships can be too complex to fully understand. In this case, Bob and Macy (the characters in the game) just had a bad night.

The first half of the night was capped off with an insightful talk given by one of the CY Team Leaders: Josh. The talk was underpinned by the apostle John's very wise words from the letter of 1 John. Focusing on chapter three, verses fourteen to eighteen, Josh examined how Christians are called to love, value and respect every human being regardless of their

imperfections, their short-comings, their sins and even their possible hate towards us. Reflecting on our study of Genesis in Term 1, Josh reminded us of how God made humans in His image and how they were the wonderful climax of all creation, which the Bible indicates "was very good" (Gen. 1:31). Knowing this important truth should form the basis of how we relate, connect, associate and interact with other people. The challenge for both CYers and CY leaders, therefore, was to relate in love to those around us, whether family or

friends, school mate or work colleague, boyfriend or girlfriend. This simple yet profound demand will help us to grow in our likeness of Christ - but also radically shape how we think about ourselves, and our relationships with others in the world.

The verse that struck me most from 1 John 3 came from verse 16: *This is how we know what love is: Jesus Christ laid down his life for us. And we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers and sisters.*

How much different would our relationships look if we lived this out daily!?

Having been both encouraged and confronted by God's Word, we then moved into the second half of the night - into workshops!

Workshop 1: *Not Dating Not Interested*

Workshop 2: *Single and Waiting: What to look for in a Guy or Girl?*

Covering topics like who to date, when to date and what to do while single - the workshop was an edifying time of learning about what the Bible directs us to in understanding living life while single.

A workshop for people dating or interested in the mechanics of dating, this workshop was full of steam and interesting topics such as: Dating and the Bible, Are You Fit for Marriage?, The Limits of Physical Intimacy and How to have God-Centred Relationships. I will share three interesting points that anyone might find interesting and useful while dating:

3. Stay vertical - not horizontal (from points on how to avoid having sex before marriage).

This year's BGR night was definitely a little different to previous years, mainly because of the structure of the night and the three workshops – which offered CYers freedom of choice in what they would like to learn particularly in the face of such a broad topic. Overall we, the leaders, hope that each CYer took something away about God's plan for relationships.
